

Note from the Dramaturg

Dr. Jane Goodall was born in England in 1934 with the dream of going to Africa and studying the chimpanzees. She was mesmerized by the ways in which they were similar to human beings, and in understanding their behavior. At a time when little girls in England were expected to be 'proper,' and go into certain jobs like being secretaries or working at shops, Jane had other ambitions. Many people around Jane did not think that she would be able to do it. However, her mother never laughed at her, and even accompanied her on her first trip to Tanzania in 1960. Later, Goodall went on to get her PhD at Cambridge University. In an interview, she explained that she did so in order for other, more traditional scientists wearing white coats to take her more seriously. She did not want people laughing at her just because she did not look like a 'real' scientist.

Jane did not let any of those naysayers get to her. She took multiple trips to Africa, wrote many books about the behavior of chimpanzees, and continues to work to teach young people that if they work hard enough, they can achieve anything in order to make the world into a better place.

While you are watching Me...Jane, I encourage you to think about your wildest dreams. If you could be or do anything, what would it be? What could you do to make those dreams come true? It might not always be easy—people might not always understand the ways in which you think you are doing good in the world. But, if you stay true to yourself, then, as Jane proves to us, it is possible. Or, think smaller even. What can you do today to help someone? How can you make their day just a little bit better?

I hope that Jane inspires you to go on your own adventures and learn about the world so that one day, you can help to make it a better place. Jane says it most powerfully in her own words:

"I think the most important thing for you to do as a child is to understand that every day that you live you make a difference in the world and everything you do is making an impact in this world. And you've got a choice: you can either go to bed at the end of the end of a day, think about what you've done and feel kind of good because you've done things that made things better...or you can go to bed and say you didn't do very well today. But whatever you do, you are going to make a difference."

Go into the world, explore, and rejoice in your findings. You can achieve anything!


